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Navy Expeditionary Combat Command (NECC)

NECC FY15

Navy Expeditionary Combat Command (NECC) serves as the single functional command for the Navy's expeditionary forces and as central management for the readiness, resources, manning, training and equipping of those forces. Expeditionary forces are organized to accomplish specific objectives in other countries.

NECC is a scalable force spanning the full range of military operations from theater security to major combat. Made up of dedicated, ready Sailors, NECC forces are high impact, operating around the globe, building partnerships, and helping increase partner navies' capability to promote peace and prevent war. However, when called upon, they also become primary enablers for a combat commander to win a crisis or war effort.

NECC is a force provider for integrated maritime expeditionary missions. The subordinate units are a core expeditionary force providing "smart power," applying just the right power, at the right time, at the right place. This may cover a variety of missions such as: effective waterborne and ashore anti-terrorism, force protection, theater security cooperation and engagement, humanitarian assistance/disaster relief contingencies, and supplementing other Governmental agencies for homeland security upon request.

NECC forces seamlessly blend Active and Reserve components with Reserve units training and deploying like their Active counterparts. Using operational Reserve forces, the Reserve Component is fully capable of providing the same capability and capacity as their Active counterparts.

NMCB Detachments Realign, but still "Can Do!"

The Naval Construction Force (NCF) has been tasked to reduce its number of Reserve Naval Construction Regiments (NCR's) and Naval Mobile Construction Battalions (NMCB's). During FY15, the disestablishment of the 9th NCR and NMCB's 17, 26, and 28, and their associated NMCB Training Unit Identification Code (TRUIC) units, resulted in numerous Navy Operational Support Center (NOSC) Operation Support Units (OSU) having large populations of Seabees.

Responding to the needs of Seabees and in determining the best way to maximize the "fit/fill" of the remaining billets, a nationwide RC Seabee manpower analysis was conducted. That analysis determined viable geographic locations where TRUICs could be reestablished, bringing stability to non-assigned Seabees and addressing manpower requirements.

To geographically encompass more Seabees within available detachments, the overall number of TRUIC's was increased from 8 to 10 per NMCB, covering more NOSC's throughout the nation. The NCF also consolidated all of its battalions and regiments to either Gulfport or Port Hueneme, eliminating the previous RSS facilities and co-locating the RC Seabee Units with their AC counterparts.

- CRS-8: 22 Reserve Sailors conducted operations for the Groton, CT, high-value unit (HVU) submarine escort mission playing a vital role in ensuring force protection requirements were met for transiting HVUs.
